The **Agriculture** Academy gives you the chance to explore a career in the agriculture industry before you graduate from high school! Jobs in agriculture (the food and fiber industry) are as varied and exciting as they have ever been, and cutting edge technologies are creating new careers at a rapid pace.

Just take a look at all of the Career Opportunities listed below. You don't need to come from a farming background to participate in these agriculture and/or horticulture courses.

You may enroll in any or all of the courses listed in the Academy through your high school guidance counselor. You are not required to take all of the courses within the Academy to earn college credit for an individual course.

How much will it cost?

Your school district pays for your courses. You and your family are saving \$165/credit hour (SCC's in-state tuition cost for 2015-2016).

Check with your high school guidance counselor but you most likely will need to provide your own transportation and purchase your textbooks.

Who may participate?

Any high school student who meets the requirements may participate, check with your high school guidance counselor.

What may I do after high school?

When you enroll in courses in the **Agriculture** Academy, you may select areas for study that suit your own career goals, or use the courses to explore possibilities in this area. If you enroll in the Agriculture Program at SCC, you may bypass the courses you have already taken, saving time and money. You will also have accumulated skills that are highly valued in the workplace.

Agriculture Course Descriptions

Fall Semester

AGA-114 Principles of Agronomy

Credit: 3 Detailed studies will be made of corn and soybean production, fertilization and harvesting methods. The processing of seed and grain will also be studied in this course, along with a close look at other cropping alternatives for the corn belt area. Laboratory work will be used to increase the understanding of key concepts.

AGS-113 Survey of the Animal Industry

Credit: 3 Course studies ways domestic animals serve the basic needs of humans for food, shelter, protection, fuel and emotional well-being. Terminology, basic structures of the industries surrounding the production, care and marketing of domestic animals in the U.S. will also be studied.

Spring Semester

AGA-154 Fundamentals of Soil Science

Credit: 3 This course covers soil properties affected by their formation due to climate, vegetative cover, parent material, drainage and topography. Laboratory work will be used to increase the understanding of key concepts.

ELE-130 Home and Farm Electricity

Credit: 3 This course introduces the requirements for residential and farm electrical systems. Emphasis will be placed on local and national Electrical Codes. Hands-on experience will include such activities as basic wiring of the service entrance, circuits, switches, receptacles, lighting, special appliance circuits, and motor circuits. This course is specifically designed for students not choosing a construction curriculum.
